Aims of Policy

- To provide a procedure for dealing with drug paraphernalia and drug, alcohol and/or tobacco related incidents
- To provide a procedure for dealing with a drug related disclosure
- To state the school policy on teaching drug, alcohol and tobacco education

Drug Paraphernalia

If drug paraphernalia (Appendix 1) is found on school premises it must be handled with care, ONLY BY AN ADULT. Gloves may be required.

If the object is not accessible to the children it should be left in situe, cordoned off and left for the Police to remove.

If the object could be touched by a child it should be carefully removed to a safe place.

Needles should be picked up in the middle and placed into a container for safety. Any sharp items should be disposed of in a designated bin (Sharps Bin – kept in the Site manager's Room) – Under no circumstances should needles be placed in a normal bin.

In all cases the discovery of objects should be reported to the Head/ Deputy/Site Manager. In most cases this will be reported to the Police and LA Security. The incident will be logged on an Incident Form (Guidance Sheet 3)

See Guidance Sheet 4, 5, 6 and 7 for guidance of steps to follow to deal with drugs near school, dealing with evidence of drugs use, medical emergencies and safeguarding concerns.

Incidents

If a drug, alcohol or tobacco related incident occurs e.g. finding substances on a child or in a child's belongings, the Head/Deputy should be informed immediately.

The Head/Deputy will inform the parents and the Police/Making it Back Service using the contacts list (Appendix 4) as necessary. The incident will be logged on an Incident Form (Guidance Sheet 3)

Disclosure

If a child discloses that they been using substances or offered drugs the incident should be reported to the Head/Deputy immediately.

The Head will inform the parents and the Police/Making it Back Service as necessary. The incident will be logged on an Incident Form (Guidance Sheet 3) and a copy placed in the child's file.

Drug, Alcohol and Tobacco Education

At St. Mark's we have a whole school approach to the teaching of drug, alcohol and tobacco education as outlined in the PSCHE policy and scheme of work. The Stockport Spiral Scheme of work has been adapted to the needs of our children and is taught throughout the school from Reception to Year 6. Learning objectives grids show coverage and progression. (Appendix 5)
